Lineworker training is extensive

Lineworkers are an invaluable asset to any electric utility as they work to deliver safe, reliable electric service to all customers in all weather conditions.

To help utilities ensure that their lineworkers are properly trained to work on or near energized equipment, a lineworker must complete a comprehensive 5 1/2 to 7-year electrical training program that combines practical and theoretical curriculum to reach a 1st Class Journeyman Lineworker status.

Qualified programs focus on industry training set by OSJA 1910.269, the National Electrical Safety Code, and the American Public Power Association's Safety Manual. **Ensuring quality training** and practical opportunity to develop the proficiencies and experience in each of the lineworker skill sets, including underground and overhead construction, electrical troubleshooting, emergency operations, etc., is the utility's best means for ensuring the safety of the worker, the public and the electrical system.

Call 811 before you start to dig

If you plan to dig, call Digsafe at 811 at least 72 hours before you start

your project. DigSafe will notify utility members who are responsible to mark only the facilities that they own or maintain.

Digsafe does not mark privately owned utilities on private property. Certain underground utilities may be utility owned up to the property line; call the utility to be sure you know what the utility owns

and what the property owner owns. It is the responsibility of the property

owner to investigate privately owned utilities and to contact a private locating company.

DigSafe is a free service through member utility companies, including RMLD, who want to help ensure your safe-

ty when digging. More information about DigSafe and contacting private locating firms can be found on the DigSafe.com website.
